Devastating Earthquakes Rock Taiwan

October 10 is Taiwan's national birthday; we called it Double Tenth Holiday. But this year, the government canceled all the celebrations because of the earthquake on September 21, the saddest national anniversary day.

The strongest earthquake to strike Taiwan in 100 years killed at least 2,300 people and more than 8,300 were injured. So many people lost all they had in 20 seconds and felt how lines between life and death are so close. After the killer quake, people realized life is cannot be taken for granted, even with a lot of uncertainty and potential risk in our lives. September 24 was our homecoming, and it was also the Moon Festival. This is the reunion day for Chi-

nese people, but this year it was deadly silent. "The situation was extremely dire and there's nothing left," one survivor said. "This was absolutely the most violent thing imaginable, many people are feeling emotionally sickened

Now Taiwan struggles to recover from the devastating earthquake. It's a painful start and our people have a long way



to go. Reading the tragic stories on the Internet, it's really hard to believe what happened in Formosa, especially across the ocean. "The first thing I did was my parents are okay," said Jun-

nately my parents are fine, but we lost two TV's and my computer," Chen said. More than ten thousand aftershocks hit Taiwan; no one knows when will it slow down. No matter how many tears and trembling, we still have to face it. It was the most horrible moment in my life.


It's about that time again, Halloween! That means candy. scary movies, and most of all costumes. From Barney for the toddlers to the vampires for the

Hacky sack is soon becoming the fastest growing 'sport' Clay's history. Now the word 'sport' may be taken quite literally.


Just recently work been has done to put together a hacky sack club together.
