

Our Library

The Washington-Clay School Library was established twelve years ago. This library consisted of approximately 1,000 books, with Miss Charlotte Post as librarian. In 1947, Mr. Rogers became the librarian. The library now consists of over 4,000 books.

This year, two new sets of encyclopedias, twelve new editions of Webster's Dictionary, and numerous other books have been added. With the new appropriation, many more books will be added within the next year.

Under the able direction of Mr. Rogers, and with the co-operation of all the teachers, the students are participating in a vast reading program. During the month of October, over 2,000 books were circulated. This is twice as much as in 1948, and three times more than in 1947.

Beverly Martin: "One that has a good sense of humor! He should always try to see the student's point."


Martha Singer: "One who can express himself so clearly that all the students get the point. A sense of humor is a must!"

During the third quarter, the Colonials held the Tigers to a 7 point gain while they picked up 18. Big Don Schlundt lead our team with 27 points; Tale man was high point man for the Ti gers with 9 points.

Victory, victory is our cry! The Colonials chalked up three out of three wins when they defeated Madison 56-41 in the Washington-Clay gym November 18.

Don Schlundt, 6'8" Clay center made a new gym record and tied the county one when he scored 31 points. Johnson made 15 points to rank second high point man. Madison's chief scorer was Laidic who copped 16 points.

Lakeville travels to our gymnasium on Tuesday evening, November 28, to try their luck at defeating the Colonials.
