Coach Reinebold Views Upcoming Colonial Season


After four years of coaching at Clay, Coach James Reinebold sees a nucleus for possibly his best team. However, success will depend upon how much the players utilize their potential and how serious they are in improving their skills and knowledge.

Though the team will be made up of more experienced players, Coach sees a need for more depth at almost every position because it would be difficult to keep the team running at top performance in the event of serious injuries. Mr. Reinebold says, "Experience doesn't necessarily bring success; it's how hungry the players are to learn." With eleven returning lettermen, almost all the starting positions will be filled at least tentatively until Coach posts them.

Coach Reinebold has his greatest concern for the infield. A different starting infield may have to be instituted. Last year's first baseman, Greg Smith, is no longer at Clay. This year George Grenert and Ron DeHaven will battle for first. Possibly pitchers may be used when not pitching. Gary King, who last year as a freshman took over third base midway in the season, may be placed at second this year. One of the biggest changes may be at shortstop. With last year's shortstop, Mark Miller, graduating, Charlie Clark may take over that position instead of second which he played last year. Pat Smith, last year's utility infielder, may be starting as third baseman.

The outfield seems stable with four returning lettermen in Tim Fick, Gregg Ivins, Jesse Neely, and Ron DeHaven. These outfielders will have to hustle for Coach made this statement, "There are good Bteamers from last year ready to take the regulars' places." At catcher, Coach Reinebold would like to see two experienced players and a younger one in case of emergencies. This year's replacement for Rusty Sparks, last year's Kiwanis winner and graduate, will

most likely be Jim Campbell. In rounding out the positions, the diamond men are fortunate in the fact that both starting pitchers, Bill Brooks and Mike Borkowski, are returning. Both are experienced and have had good previous seasons. As Coach Reinebold said, "Bill Brooks and Mike Borkowski could be two of the best pitchers in the area."

In viewing the 1967 baseball season Coach finds a tougher schedule in teams like East Chicago Washington, Jeffersonville, Culver Military, and most South Bend schools will be strong. Nevertheless he said, "If the boys live up to their potential, with baseball their prime interest, and barring injuries, there is a good chance to go to the state championship."

Returning Seniors Add Experience

Bill Brooks, George Grenert, and Jesse Neely are returning senior lettermen for the Colonial diamond men this year.

Bill has been on the pitching staff for 3 years and is expecting his best season. Bill's ERA has improved steadily; last year it was 2.090, compared with other pitchers in the area; this is termed outstanding by Coach Reinebold. He returned and turned in two years on the mound for Clay, winning a letter his Sophomore year and a medal his junior year.

Bill is not only a good pitcher but makes the fable "Pitchers aren't hitters" untrue. He hit .326 last season with 1 homerun, 3 doubles, and 23 total bases. Clutch hitting is one of George Grenert's specialties. Although George was at bat 13 times

and collected only 3 hits, they came in key situations to help keep Colonial rallies alive.

Team Bound For Kentucky

Features of the 1967 educational baseball trip to Kentucky will be the Patton Museum, Army basic training, and the Gold Depository. "The trip has been planned so that besides baseball, the boys will be able to see as many educational things as possible", says head coach James Reinebold.

On April 4 the diamond men will arrive at Fort Knox, Kentucky, and will stay for 4 days at Camp Carlson, a youth camp. Bob Park, head baseball coack a Fort Knox, and Walter Hale, officer in charge of facilities, will make sure that the ball team has plenty to do and see.

Suring their stay games have been scheduled on April 5th and 6th with workouts on the 4th 5th, and 6th. Tours are planned and the boys will observe army basic training, and eat with soldiers.

On the trip home, an overnight stay at Jeffersonville, Indiana, has been arranged by Coach Reinebold and head coach "Doc" Bolton at Jeffersonville. Games will be played there on April 7th and 8th and a tour of the Hillerick-Bradsby Baseball Bat Company has also been planned. The trip may be concluded with a tour of Lincoln's birthplace. The team will arrive home on the evening of April 8th.

1966 was George's first year on the diamond and as a junior he started the practice season in the outfield. With competition rough, Coach Reinebold decided to give the six-footer a chance at first base.

Jess Neely, centerfielder, combines hustle, alertness and a good stick, to make him outstanding as one of Clay's ballplayers. Hitting .383, he lead the club in hits, with 23, and was third in total bases with 26.

Throughout the season Jess showed that not only power in batting helps win ball games, but that it also takes a consistent hitter who can get on base and score.

Jess never started a game but he did sone fine releif pitching with a .000 ERA, and only 6 hits tallied against him.

Perhaps his greatest attribute was his superb fielding. Out of 17 games as an outfielder he committed only 1 error for a .917 fielding average.

8 Game Win Streak Highlights '66 Season

The 1966 baseball season for the Clay Colonials was especially encouraging. Among many of their feats they compiled a 15-3 record which included an eight game win streak. During this long winning streak the Colonials defeated: S.B. Washington, Culver Military, S.B. Adams and Logansport in single games and Laville and Edwardsburg in double headers. This streak is believed to be a school record.

On April 9 the Colonials opened their baseball season against LaVille in a double header at Bendix Park. Bill Brooks pitched a three hitter with an accompanying 13 strike outs to win the first game 3-1. In the second game a raft of Clay pitchers struck out 13 Lancers, and won the game 4-1.

Then on April 13 the Colonials traveled to the home of the S.B. Washington Panthers. The Colonials tallied 2 runs to win 2-1. Bill Brooks received his second win in the series pitching a two hitter with nine strike outs.

The Colonials played and defeated Edwardsburg High School in a double header at Bendix. In the opening game Mike Borkowski hurled a four hitter with 8 strike outs for a 2-1 win. Jim Campbell, the Colonials' catcher, got two hits. In the second game Clayhad 13 hits with Ivins, Clark and Miller each collecting 2, including a triple while defeating Edwardsburg 16-1.

Two weeks later, the Colonials swung back into action with a game with Culver Military. Charlie Clark led scoring with a two-run home run. The Cadets came back to tie the game, but late inning singles by Jess Neely and Greg Ivins gave the Colonials a hard fought sixth victory, 6-4. The winning pitcher was Bill Brooks.

The following day the Colonials won over their neighboring city rivals S.B. Adams. The major blows of the game were Mark Miller's and Bill Brooks' clouting of back to back home runs in a 7 run sec. inning. Shoddy defense and poor pitching put the game up for grabs, until Mike Borkowski came in as a relief pitcher and saved the game for the Colonials. The 8th and final game of the win streak came at Bendix Park on May 7 against Logans-

port. The Colonials defeated the Berries 2-1. The second game of the Logansport double header ended the win streak with an 11-3 loss.

Team Loses 3 Lettermen

Three valuable lettermen were lost at the end of the 1966 baseball season-two by graduation and one by change of residence.

Mark Miller, a 1966 graduate, played shortstop for most of the three years he was on Clay's varsity. Besides being an alert fielder, he was a strong hitter. Mark attended Albion College during the first semester this fall and has since transferred to Indiana University, South Bend

Rusty Sparks, graduating with Mark, played catcher in his two years of varsity action. Rusty received the Kiwanis Award for the most outstanding senior, not only in baseball, but in school also. He is currently attending Rose Polytechnic Institute in Terre Haute.

Greg Smith, a senior this year at a high school in Ocean Side, California, played both first base and pitcher for Clay last year.

Doug Mac Gregor, who quarterbacked Adams to 15th in the state, also will throw for the baseball team. One of his receivers in football, John Kaiser, played in the infield last year. Adams has dominated the city in every sport in the South Bend area so far this year.

RED DEVILS FINISH 3RD

Al Gabriel will be pitching to Rick Kominarek much of the time for the Michigan City Red Devils. Coach Dave Parry's team finished 3rd in the NIC Conference last year after a 2 and 8 season. They haven't lost to Clay in 3 years.

Logansport, one of Clay's victims last year, completed a 12-5 season. Seniors Jim Conrad, Phil Hershberger, and Dick Farrer expect to see a lot of action as the Berries try to remain number one in the North Central Conference. S.B. St. Joseph, destroyers of Clay's high hopes for city champs last year, anticipate action from Mark Pajakowski and brothers Jim Brunette and Joe Brunette.

On Clay's schedule for the first time are the La Salle Lions. Their record last year was 2 and 9, but since they haven't had a graduating class yet, all the players are returning. Coldwater, 2nd in the Twin Valley Conference, with an 11 and 7 record, lost only 5 players, and is the last opponent.




