This would also relieve the Council of some of the responsibilities for the success of tradition-events.

Any athletic team needs fans--someone to make winning worth while. No team will play well when the stands are empty. Council members also need encouragement. They need to be pushed, and to be given an incentive to work. Why try for people who act as though they couldn't care less?

"That's awful. Isn't there anyway you can fix it?"


"That's what I'm down here for, I'm buying scotch tape."



Clay's track team will try to improve upon their 1967 track record by attempting to place in as many events as they can in the South Bend track sectional.

Although head track coach Huston says, "chances of scoring in this year's track sectional are slim," he is encouraged by good performances. Some of these are Doug Baily, holder of the school record for the two mile; Ron Sanders, holder of the pole vault record; and Bruce Carter, holder of the 100 yard dash record.

This year Adams is a heavy favorite for the sectional, but coach Huston is undaunted, and hopeful that a few of the boys will score.

The boys themselves are prepared to give all they've got as a determined Dan Miller says, "we'll be ready," and co-captain Bruce Carter says, "we're an improved team over last year."

The track team has one more dual meet left after the sectional. It is with Edwardsburg, Wednesday, May 17.

Revenge is on the mind of the Colonial baseball team as they head into tonight's game with St. Joe at Bendix. Earlier this year St. Joe defeated Clay 17-2 in a game marred by Colonial errors--both mental and fielding.

In that game Clay's number 1 pitcher, Bill Brooks, was tagged for seven runs in the fourth inning and Jay Parker game up eight more in the next inning. The Colonial batting attack also faltered as they were able to garner only two hits off Craig Hartzer.

Brooks came back, however, and pitched a strong six innings against LaVille, shutting them out 6-0 and striking out 13. The Colonials won the second game of the doubleheader 18-2 as Tim Fick slammed five hits in as many at bats.
