It's the bake sales that flopped, the pride that didn't; the creativity and energy that made the 1972 prom one of the most unusual ones in Clay history, as well as setting precedence for future Clay proms. It's the people who didn't give in to senioritis, who gave their all. It's the teacher who says, "I'm really going to miss this class. Maybe I'll leave with you." It's skits for pep rallies; a new student government; being sprayed with water at car washes, coke at home basketball games, and pride in all that was done.

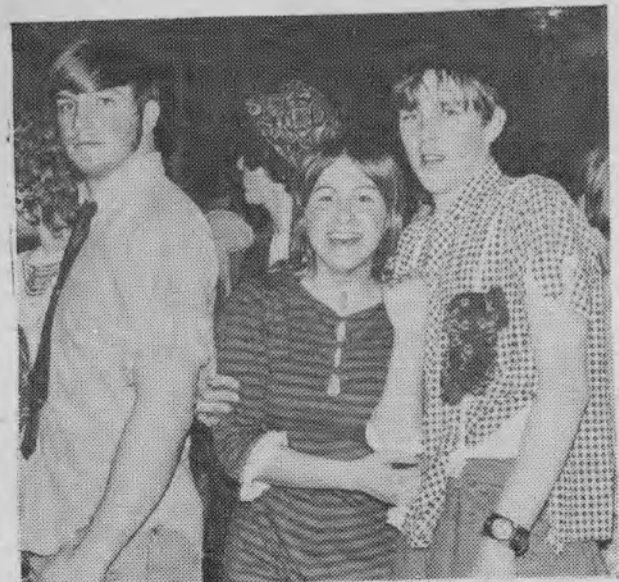

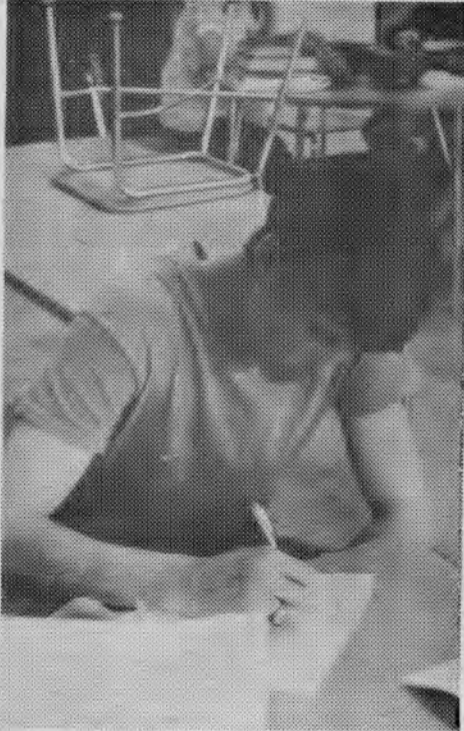
Last comments criticize and praise Clay High School

The only thing I really learned was how to read and write. I also found out who really is important in high school, the high society groups. This high school has told me that people don't give a damn towards anyone but themselves.

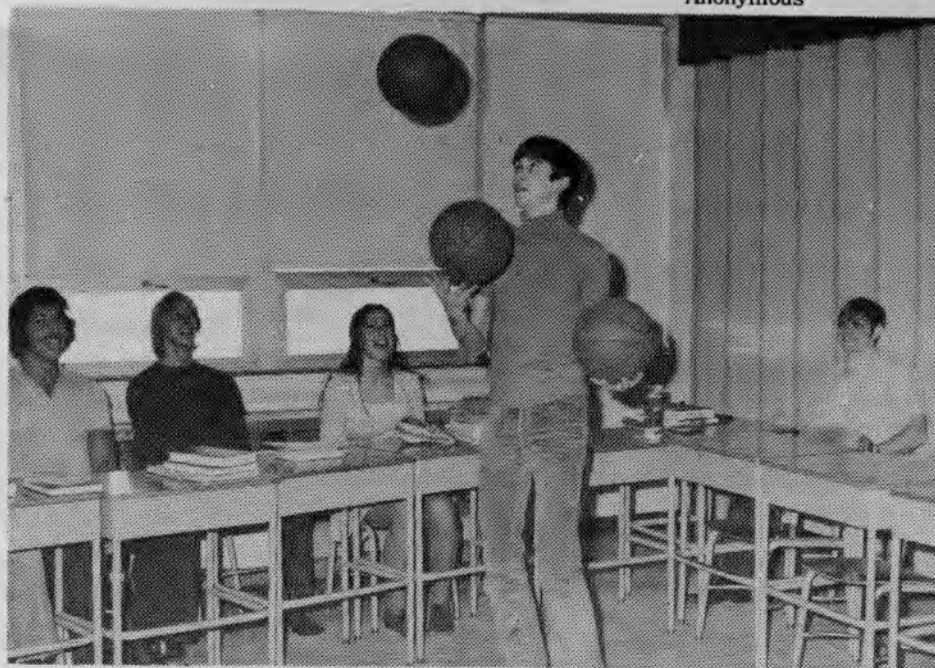

DEBBIE DARNELL

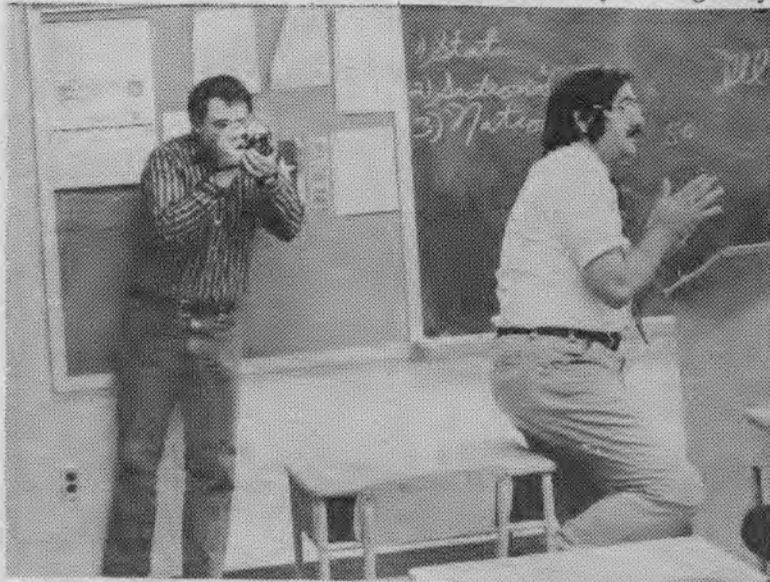
This summer she will be working at South Bend Drug Company. Her plans for the future include graduating from college and possibly becoming an elementary school teacher.

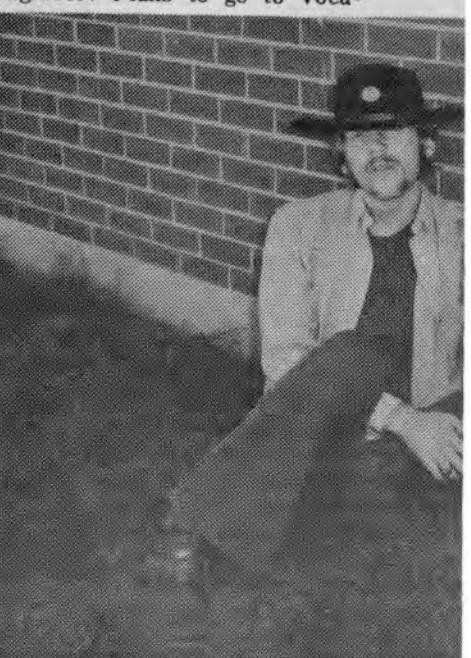

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Colonial athletes compile winning record

A year is a long time. An athletic season can be even longer. To Clay's 12 varsity sports teams and the unofficial Clay hockey team, the 1972-73 season included individual and team accomplishments, school records broken, and long hours of practice.

Statistics in this article include the varsity sports of: football, cross country, tennis, volleyball, girl's and guy's swimming, wrestling, basketball, baseball, track, softball and golf, as well as the hockey team.

It has often been heard by many Clayites and others, "Clay hasn't got anything," but looking back at this year, that can hardly be said with validity. Thus far this year (as of May 15) the Colonials have combined for a record of 95 wins, 60 losses, and 3 ties. This speaks for itself.

The fall sports (football, volleyball, cross country, and tennis) began a little slowly, as they totaled only 17 wins against 20 defeats.

The gridders, led by captains Rod Davidson and Jeff Wesolek, had a record of 4-5. They had victories over New Prairie, St. Joe (Mich.), John Glenn, and Penn, to high-light homecoming. Head coach Jack Lowe resigned on April 9 thus making way for a new head coach. Coaches Tom King and Dan Polizzotto both applied for the position.

"We are making our decision right now," said Tom Saunders, athletic director at Clay, so before school's out the coach will be announced. Some twenty people applied for the position.

Harriers lead fall sports

The Harriers, coached by Jim Warren, posted a fine record of 7-3, and all three losses were close. Seniors Al Moss and Dan Fischer along with junior Steve Wojcik were constantly among the team's top finishers all season long.

This past year's Racketers had a trying season as they won 4, lost 4, and were rained out of 5 meets. Coach Turnock's team tied for second in the Conference with a 3-3 tally.

Volleyball, the feminine fall sport, posted a meager 2-8 record. The team, coached by Ms. Mitchell and captained by seniors Jamie Pierce and Patty Zawlocki, ended the season on a pleasant note by out-playing North Liberty 15-3, 11-15, and 15-4.

The Colonial Winter sports (basketball, wrestling, hockey, and both swim teams) produced a winning 38-32-3 season.

The Cagers, coached by Jim Waller, came up with a total of 4 victories and 16 defeats. However the season was not in total vain as a new record was set. On Feb. 17 the Netters scored the most points ever by a Clay team by trouncing Marian 107-71.

Coach Waller came up with a revolutionary two-platoon system towards the season's end that brought the Colonials limited success and optimism for the future.

This year's wrestling team, captained by senior Gary Montgomery, and junior Randy Root, earned a 3-8 slate. The season had its bright spots as junior Mark Kline won the heavy weight sectional title, and numerous individuals posted winning seasons. The squad was coached by David Gleason and Dan Polizzotto, assistant coach.

The hockey team, which is not recognized by the school but supported by the students, came up with a season's record of 12-3-2.

The stickmen, captained by senior Mark Makielski, won their division and a trophy as well as coming in second in the league. Mr. Dan Kasper received help in the coaching duties from Mike French, student teacher here at Clay.

Swimmers go down state

The Swimming program, both the male and female teams, turned in very good records; the guys posted a 10-4 season while the girls had a 9-1-1 campaign. Ms. Marie Kruckel and Mr. Len Deranek taught the girl's and guy's teams, respectively.



Seniors Carolyn Weller and Claire Zoller led the girls down state while senior captains Bill Luebben and Kurt Ellis and junior Mark Mamula led the guys. In the State meets the girls took 10th and the guys took 13th.

Mamula, one of the nation's fastest swimmers set a new State record in the 200 yd. I.M. (individual medly) with a time of 2:00.06.

Many school times were broken by both teams but Mamula's time was the only one turned into the Athletic Office. As Mr. Saunders put it, "we don't worry too much about swimming records right now. When we get our own pool in the new school, then we'll keep a closer tab."

It seems that as the season progresses the Colonials get better and better. Thus far the Spring sports (track, golf, softball and baseball) boast an astounding mark of 40 wins and only 8 defeats.

The Cindermen seem to be off to the slowest start as they presently stand 2-4. The Colonials are directed by rookie track coach Jim Warren who is helped by Jim Gerhold, assistant track coach.

Senior Jeff Cavender has brought some punch into the season as he set a new school mark in the shot put event of 52 feet. Also setting a record is junior Mike Meyer in the discus with a toss of 146 feet, 5 inches; the discus is a new event this year in high school track.

Golf squad sets new records

The record shattering golf squad is captained by Bob Heiden and coached by Ray Emerick, and now stands 14-3 on the season.

Heiden set a new individual course low of 71 this season while the team has set two records; a low of 308 set a new home course record at Elbel golf course while an even slimmer total of 304 sets a new school

low. The turfners still have meets yet to go, so it could be even lower.

The Softball team, still undefeated, claims a 5-0 score card. The squad which was undefeated last year at 10-0 is again under the direction of Ms. Kruckel. This team holds sole rights to the title of being the only undefeated team of the year.

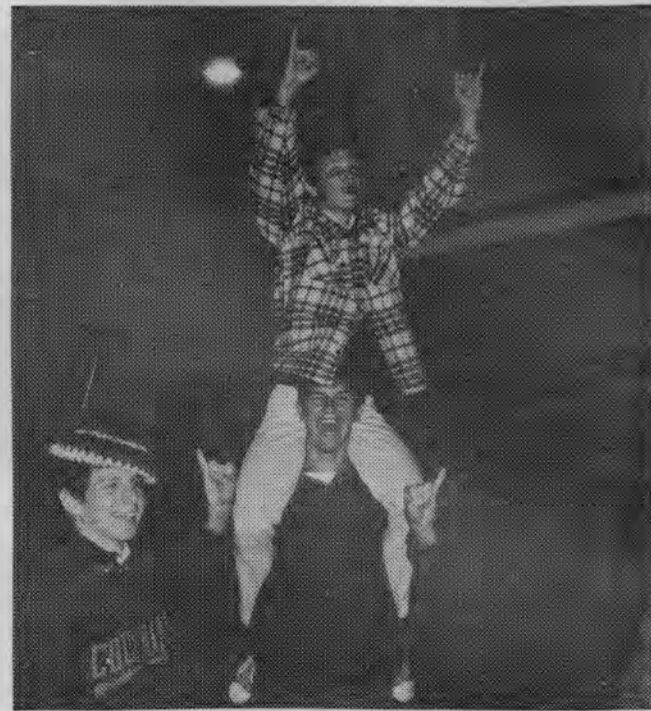
Coach Jim Reinbold's batsmen come close to that title. The state's number one ranked baseball team has suffered only two loses. Tomorrow they face Tipton in a doubleheader at Clay Park, before opening sectional action next week.

The Colonial batsmen were upset by St. Joe at Clay Park Monday. Clay finished second in the N.I. V.C.

Included thus far on the list of accomplishments is the winning of the Colonial Classic (last time Clay won it the State title came too), Reinbold's 200th victory, and a new pitching record.

Tom Myers broke the old record of 18 career victories to set a new total of most victories by a south-paw and stood 9-0 on the year.

Yes, Clay can be proud of its athletic accomplishments this past year as there is quite a list of them; a list that odds are will be even more impressive before the year is out.



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
