ing Tiggers are what everyone wants this year. It's really busy and hectic."



lace often looks like it's there for a popularity contest or fashion show rather than shopping.



necessary travel and know where you're Cruising going. around turns into sliding around far too easily.


•Keep a bag of salt in your car. This can serve two purposes. It helps put weight on the back of your car to stabilize it and the salt can help you melt snow if you get stuck.

South Bend, for the last few years, has been the slum of all places in America for a really good show. Aside from the Ticket Master conflict a couple years ago (which chased many bands away), our venues have not been used by the big bands. To catch a good show you would have to travel to such places as Chicago, Kalamazoo, Deer Creek, Chicago, or Indianapolis.

Back here in town, the JACC at Notre Dame and the Coveleski Stadium have become quite noisy places. In the past two years these venues have hosted the Steve Miller Band, the Newsboys with Third Day (for two years in a row), Dave Matthews Band, Creed, and more recently, Aerosmith with Seven Mary Three. Many fans were turned away by local ticket sellers as tickets sold out just hours after they went on sale. Aerosmith (pictured), along with platinum selling artists Seven Mary Three played for a completely sold-out crowd. Seven Mary Three, originally from Clearwater, Florida (a small town outside of Orlando) played a great set including songs such as "Water's Edge," "My, My," "Rockcrown." my all-time favorite "Cumbersome," and a few other new songs from their new album Orange Avenue.

Their set lasted about forty-five minutes, and I think that they more than held their

own with Aerosmith. Junior Michelle Thomas said "I didn't know any SM3(Seven Mary Three) songs, but they




