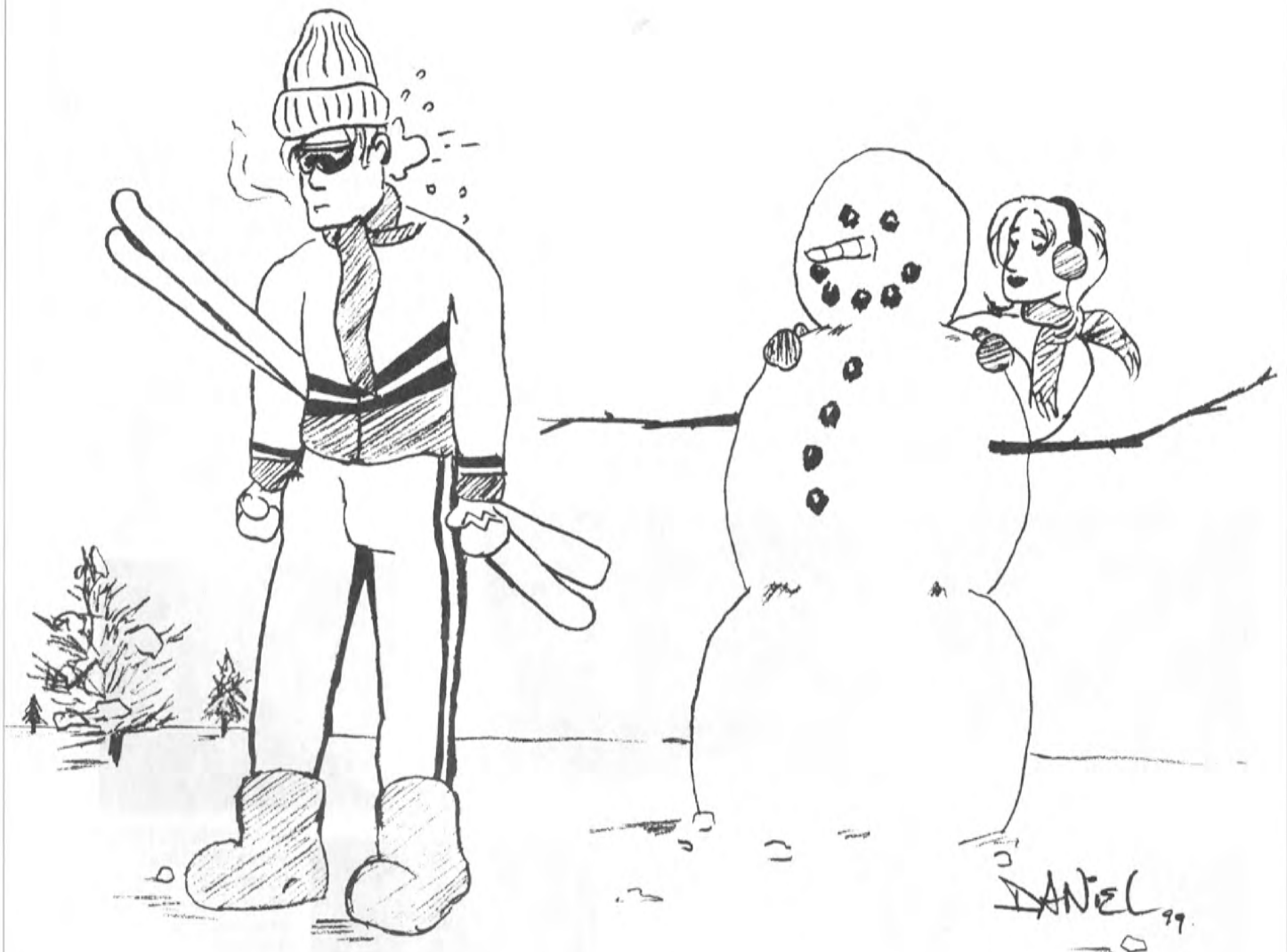

Cans, cans, cans! Juniors Win the '98 Battle

It was said last year's total could not be beat. The canned food drive had collected a total of around 61,000 cans, breaking the record from the year before. This year, Clay High School didn't just break the record. "We shattered it," principal John Harris states. "It was like the school had been saving since last January. I was at a loss for words."

Clay High School collected a total of 79,277 cans this year. The Mad Dash itself brought in around 27,000 cans. Senior LeeAnn Searight was in charge of the annual

canned food drive this year. "I was floored," she says. "Very impressed." She also has many people to thank. "Mr. Morrical, Mr. Kasper, Jenna Sousley, Colin Harding, and Glenn Nowak were a huge help. Without them I would have gone nuts."

All three local news stations covered the event. News 22 came twice. News Channel 16 came for a wrestling match originally, but when they saw what was going on they decided to get in on it. Many students collected much more than the average. Senior Aaron Corcoran collected around six hundred

cans. Sophomores Jessica Aldridge and Erin Downey were among some of the top collectors, along with Juniors Colin Harding, Brady Foose and their group

Seniors Brian Keller and Judson Howard collected around 1,800 cans together. Brian explained, "We collected \$150 in donations from businesses. Some of those businesses were Afdent Dental Care, Chandler Sales and Service, Keller Engineering, Macri's Deli, Arbor Care Tree Service and Midwest Medical Group. Brian himself donated about eighty dollars, and Judson donated about

thirty dollars. U93 radio station auctioned a Furby doll, which sold for \$350, totalling 1,400 cans that went toward the total for the senior class.

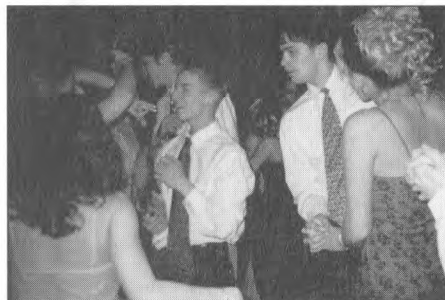
The classes competed against each other to see who could collect the most cans. Juniors came on top with 28,656 cans. Seniors came in a close second with 26,035. Sophomores had 16,132 and freshmen collected 8,454. However, LeeAnn says, "I think the juniors should drop out next year because no one will beat this record!" 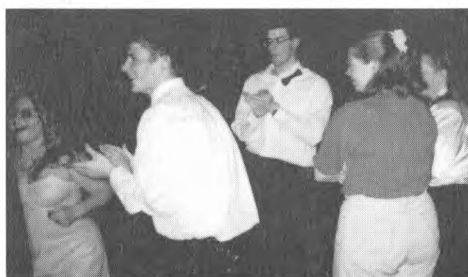

Sophomore Brandon Hopkins has a laugh with friends as Junior Adam Springer and his date watch.

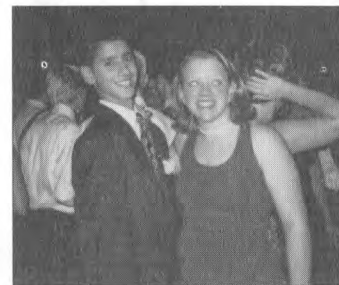

College Goal Sunday Returns to "THE BEND"

College Goal Sunday can help you take the steps necessary to afford college. Last year, more than 4,430 Indiana high-school seniors received assistance completing college financial aid paperwork at College Goal Sunday. This year, volunteers will again be available to help your family complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at College Goal Sunday '99. The FAFSA is the federal financial aid form required by most colleges, universities and vocational/technical schools nationwide.

College Goal Sunday '99 will take place at 2 p.m., Sunday, February 7, at 36 sites in 30 Indiana cities. Local site is St. Joseph County Public Library, located 304 S. Main St. At the event, financial-aid professionals, primarily from Indiana colleges and universities, volunteer their time to help students and their families complete the application.

Students attending College Goal Sunday should bring a parent or guardian

and either a completed IRS 1040 tax return, a W-2 form, or information about their family's 1998 income and benefits. Parents may attend on behalf of dependent students.

Educational prize drawing offers added incentive

This year, students who attend College Goal Sunday and complete an evaluation form are qualified to win an educational prize worth several hundred dollars to help finance a higher education. Three awards will be presented to students statewide—one for northern Indiana, one for central Indiana and one for southern Indiana. The drawing will be held in early March. Winners will be notified, and each award will be forwarded to the college or university the winning student attends in the fall of 1999.

"College Goal Sunday is a terrific opportunity for students," said College Goal Sunday spokesperson and NFL veteran wide receiver Bill Brooks. "I grew up in a tough neighborhood, and few of my friends even thought about

college. This kind of professional help was not available to them."

A former Indianapolis Colt, Brooks and his family live in Indiana, and he is dedicated to helping Hoosier students realize their dreams of success.

In addition to helping all Indiana high-school seniors, College Goal Sunday focuses on assisting Indiana's Twenty-first Century Scholars. These students signed a contract in the eighth grade and pledged to graduate from high school, refrain from using drugs and alcohol, maintain a certain grade-point average and apply for college financial aid.

Upon successful completion of the program, Twenty-first Century Scholars will receive state funds to cover their college tuition and fees for four years. Volunteers at College Goal Sunday assist Twenty-first Century Scholars in completing the FAFSA form and the other paperwork necessary to receive their Twenty-first Century Scholarships.

"The Indiana Student Fi-

nancial Aid Association is proud to be a cosponsor of College Goal Sunday," said John Fish, president of the Indiana Student Financial Aid Association (ISFAA) and director of financial aid at Vincennes University. "On behalf of ISFAA and all the financial-aid professionals throughout the state of Indiana, we are pleased to assist families in completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid."

College Goal Sunday '99 is a charitable effort of ISFAA, in cooperation with the Indiana Career and Postsecondary Advancement Center (ICPAC), the State Student Assistance Commission of Indiana (SSACI), and the Office of Twenty-first Century Scholars. It is co-funded by Lilly Endowment Inc. and USA Funds, two Indiana-based non-profits with a particular interest in higher education.

Wrestling has a double structured tournament system including both team, and individual competition. Individual sectional qualifiers from the Lasalle sectional, the one in which Clay competes, can advance to the

individual regional competition.

The sectionals start on Sat. Jan. 30th at Lasalle High School. For the past eight years the team competition has been won by either Washington or Clay, developing fierce competition over the years. The winner will advance and compete against the winner of the Penn sectional in the regional championship meet.

One Last Look

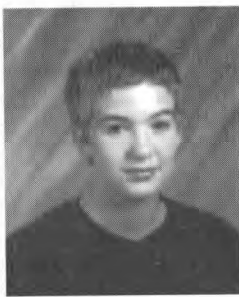

The buffing machines did not explain the fights and dances that take place in front of the door. We decided to run some tests and to analyze different people around the door. We took a small sample of the BYD and,

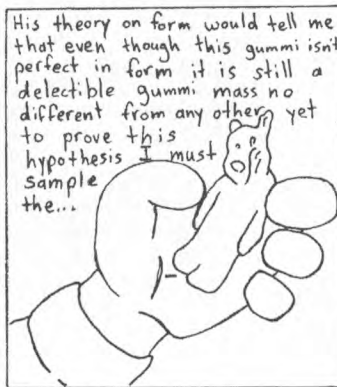
